

## Today's Plan:

**Learning Target (standard):** I will use the 1st derivative test to describe the characteristics of a function.

**Students will:** Complete practice problems over previous concepts at the boards, put up homework problems on the board and make necessary corrections to their own work, take notes over new material and complete practice problems over new concepts.

**Teacher will:** Provide practice problems over previous concepts, check homework problems for accuracy and provide students feedback, describe and provide examples of new concepts and assign students assessment problems over new concepts.

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\* Find the critical numbers \*

1) critical #s:  $x = -\frac{7}{8}$

4) critical #s:  $x = -\frac{10}{3}, 4$

2) critical #s:  $x = \frac{3}{4}$

5) critical #s:  $x = -2, 0, 2$

3) critical #s:  $x = -2, \frac{5}{3}$

6) critical #s:  $x = 1$

Find the derivative.

$$f(x) = \sin x \cdot \tan x$$

$$f'(x) = \cos x \tan x + \sin x \sec^2 x$$

Find the derivative.

$$f(x) = \sqrt{\frac{3x-5}{x^2+2}} = \left(\frac{3x-5}{x^2+2}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}$$

$$f'(x) = \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{3x-5}{x^2+2}\right)^{-\frac{1}{2}} \left[ \frac{3(x^2+2) - 2x(3x-5)}{(x^2+2)^2} \right]$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{x^2+2}{3x-5}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left[ \frac{3x^2+6-6x^2+10x}{(x^2+2)^2} \right]$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{x^2+2}{3x-5}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \left[ \frac{-3x^2+10x+6}{(x^2+2)^2} \right]$$

$$f'(x) = \frac{-3x^2+10x+6}{2 \sqrt{(3x-5)(x^2+2)^3}}$$

$$\left(\frac{x^{\frac{1}{2}}}{x^2}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}} = \frac{1}{x^{\frac{3}{2}}}$$

Find the derivative and critical numbers.

$$f(x) = \frac{2x+3}{3x-4}$$

$$f'(x) = \frac{2(3x-4) - 3(2x+3)}{(3x-4)^2}$$

$$= \frac{6x-8-6x-9}{(3x-4)^2}$$

$$f'(x) = \frac{-17}{(3x-4)^2}$$

Critical #s:

$$x = \frac{4}{3}$$

Find the critical numbers.

$$f(x) = x^3 + x^2 - 5x - 5$$

$$f'(x) = 3x^2 + 2x - 5$$

$$0 = (3x + 5)(x - 1)$$

Critical #s:

$$x = -\frac{5}{3}, 1$$

Use the 1<sup>st</sup> Derivative Test to describe the behavior of the function.

$$f(x) = x^3 + x^2 - 5x - 5 \quad \mathcal{D}_{f(x)}: \mathbb{R}$$

$$f'(x) = 3x^2 + 2x - 5 \quad \mathcal{D}_{f'(x)}: \mathbb{R}$$

$$0 = (3x + 5)(x - 1)$$

Critical #s:  $x = -\frac{5}{3}, 1$

Domain Interval	$3x+5$	$x-1$	$f'(x)$	$f(x)$
$(-\infty, -\frac{5}{3})$	-	-	+	increasing
$(-\frac{5}{3}, 1)$	+	-	-	decreasing $\rightarrow$ max = $\frac{40}{27}$ @ $x = -\frac{5}{3}$
$(1, \infty)$	+	+	+	increasing $\rightarrow$ min = $-8$ @ $x = 1$

$$f(-\frac{5}{3}) = (-\frac{5}{3})^3 + (-\frac{5}{3})^2 - 5(-\frac{5}{3}) - 5$$

$$f(1) = (1)^3 + (1)^2 - 5(1) - 5$$

• Since  $f'(x)$  goes from positive to negative @  $x = -\frac{5}{3}$ , then  $f(x)$  goes from increasing to decreasing and will have a maximum of  $\frac{40}{27}$  @  $x = -\frac{5}{3}$ .

• Since  $f'(x)$  goes from negative to positive @  $x = 1$ , then  $f(x)$  goes from decreasing to increasing and will have a minimum of  $-8$  @  $x = 1$ .

Use the 1<sup>st</sup> Derivative Test to describe the behavior of the function.

$$f(x) = x^2 - 2x - 3 \quad \mathcal{D}_{f(x)}: \mathbb{R}$$

$$f'(x) = 2x - 2 \quad \mathcal{D}_{f'(x)}: \mathbb{R}$$

$$0 = 2(x - 1)$$

Critical #s:  $x = 1$

Domain Interval	$2$	$x-1$	$f'(x)$	$f(x)$
$(-\infty, 1)$	+	-	-	decreasing
$(1, \infty)$	+	+	+	increasing $\rightarrow$ min = $-4$ @ $x = 1$

$$f(1) = (1)^2 - 2(1) - 3$$

∴ Since  $f'(x)$  goes from negative to positive @  $x = 1$ ,  $f(x)$  goes from decreasing to increasing @  $x = 1$  and will have a minimum of  $-4$  @  $x = 1$ .
