Today's Plan:

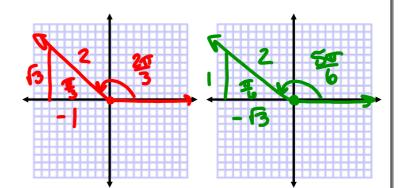
Assessment: Board work, homework check and homework assignment

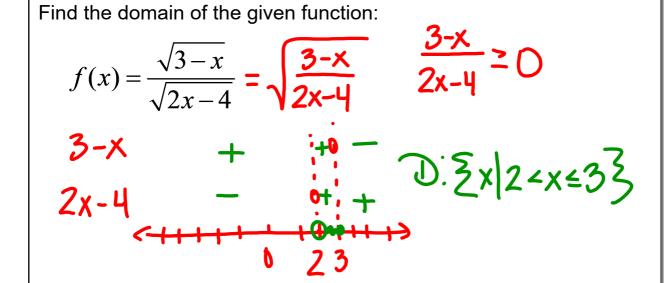
Write the transformations.

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Characteristics of a "good" graph:

- Doesn't leave room for interpretation
- Descriptive title
- Labels on the axes
 - Include title and units
 - x-axis (independent variable)
 - y-axis (dependent variable)
 - equal intervals
- Look at possible values for a situation (domain & range)
- Discrete vs. continuous data
- Rate of change
- Arrows on the ends of the graph??
